About the Contest

All Palm Beach County students are invited to participate in the annual contest in the categories of art, writing, music, and videos. Art submissions include drawing, painting, sculpture, photography, posters, and collage. The writing category includes poetry and essays, while music covers songs with lyrics as well as instrumental compositions. Often the entries received create an expansion of a category, as happened this year with videos that included spoken word performances.

Cash prizes are awarded to the winning students. In addition to first, second, and third place, other good work is acknowledged with honorable mentions and special judges awards. Many teachers find that the inspiring topics selected each year such as Advocacy, Hope, Liberty, Courage, and the 2022 theme, Community, often make good starting points for class assignments and discussions, and they encourage their students to explore and interpret the concepts through artistic expression.
